The alternative rock band Deep Blue Something was formed in 1993 in Denton, Texas. The title of their biggest hit, "Breakfast at Tiffany's" (1995), comes from the 1961 Audrey Hepburn movie of the same name. The song reached #5 in the United States and #1 in the U.K.

MACARENA

In 2002 VH1 aired "100 Greatest One Hit Wonders." "Macarena" was the #1 greatest one hit wonder. Originally released in 1995 by the Spanish duo Los del Río, the song was remixed by The Bayside Boys and became a summer hit in 1996, holding the #1 spot on the Billboard Hot 100 for 14 weeks—one of the longest #1 runs in history. At the 1996 nationally-televised Democratic National Convention in Chicago, the convention delegates performed the Macarena dance as they waited for the speakers. The dance was taught to them by a Wisconsin delegate who learned the dance from her 12-year-old daughter who learned the dance in Spanish class.

Academy Award-winning songwriter, arranger, composer, singer and pianist Randy Newman wrote "You've Got a Friend in Me" for the 1995 Pixar film *Toy Story*. The movie won an Academy Special Achievement Award for being the first ever feature-length computer-animated film. Newman scored four other films for Pixar: *A Bug's Life*; *Cars*; *Monsters, Inc.*; and *Toy Story 2*.
